Leo Tolstoy was one of the great Russian philosophers and reformers and a staunch friend of the peasant class. His son, Count Ilya Tolstoy, is an admirer of his father's theories and is carrying them to all parts of the world.

Count Tolstoy has addressed crowded auditoriums all over the country on the subject of his country's unhappy plight. He was in the turmoil of the original Russian revolution and close to Kerensky. He is 52 year's old, and has been sixteen months away from his country, during which time he has heard mothing of his mother or family, whom he left on his estate near Moscow.

He was educated at the University of Moscow. Near Moscow the Tolstoy estate of 5,000 acres, surrounding a palatial home, was situated. All but 200 acres of this was divided among the peasants as a condition of the elder Tolstoy's will. What has become of the remainder of the estate under the Bolshevik rule, Count Tolstoy thinks that eventually his country will rise triumphantly above Bolshevism.
