Considerably less food was held in the cold storage plants of the State under State supervision in Pennsylvania on April 1, than a year ago with the exception of eggs which are going into storage slightly earlier than usual. A summary of the reports made to Dairy and Ploud Commissioner James Foust against 185,000 docates a year ago.

The reduction of deposits is accounted for by the fact that there is a bigger demand for certain foods and that the poultry trade has been at soorbing the chickens and ducks instead of allowing them to remain!

The figures as summarized from 29 plants reporting beef, 23 pork, 24 eggs, 22 butter, 21 poultry, 19 mutton and 8 fish, run as follows: Eggs-7-16,442 dozens against 2,-179,239 on January 1 and 188,150 dozens a year ago.






