Any one driving from Harrisburg to Hallfax or Lykens over Peters Mountain will tell you of the fine outlook at the highest crossing, es-pecially looking to the north. Shepherdstown hill affords good views in the Cumberland Valley. A very good one is from the tower of the hotel. It is said this was a place of observation in Civil War times.






