Morris, while out on bail furnished by his father on the mur-der indictment, shot and killed Mag-istrate Blueford Sullivan here March 29 and since that time has been hid-ing in the Blue Ridge mountains. A preliminary hearing on the killing of the magistrate also is to be held to-day.


