
German Envoys to **Peace Conference**

Copenhagen, April 21.—Foreign Minister Count Von Brockdorff-Rantzau, of Germany, has an-nounced that three envoys will be sent to Versailles April 25 author-ized to receive the text of the peace preliminaries, according to a dis-patch from Berlin received here early to-day. The delegation will be headed by Minister Von Haniel, whose asso-ciates will be Herrs Von Keller and Ernst Schmitt, legation counsellors. They will be attended by two offl-cials and two chancery servants. have selected a medal to be presented to every soldier receiving mail at the postoffice at the time they responded to their country's call. The edal, made of bronze, consists of a






