

ASK PUBLISHERS TO HELP STAMP OUT RADICALISM

Heads of Printin Trades Unions Admit Spread of Bolshevism

By Associated Press. New York, April 25.—Appeals to American newspaper publishers to aid in fighting the spread of ultra heads of two international printing trades unions yesterday at the annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association.

The day's sessions were devoted entirely to labor questions and by invitation the heads of the four international unions engaged in the newspaper printing trade addressed the convention.

The four union leaders were James J. Freel, president of the International Stereotyping and Electrical Workers' Union; William McHugh, acting president of the Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union; John W. Hays, secretary and treasurer of the International Typographical Union; and Matthew Wolf, president of the International Photo Engravers' Union.

Mr. McHugh said that many members of local unions had been won away by the doctrines of Bolshevism, but that all the officers of the international unions of the printing trade realized the fallacy of such doctrines and were strenuously contesting their spread.

Sharp Drop in Temperature Makes Ice; 20-Mile Gale Sweeps Over This District

Sharp drops in the temperature of more than thirty-five degrees last night and this morning brought out

many overcoats that had been tucked away for the summer. The cold wave, which overspread the entire Central Pennsylvania section, was accompanied by a twenty-mile northwest gale.

Just what damage has been done to the opening fruit tree buds by the freezing weather could not be well ascertained this morning.

Fruit owners, however, feel certain that the damage has not been great. The wind which accompanied the cold weather, however, counteracted to a certain extent its influence.

Water was frozen in some sections, it was reported. More than one locality had quarter-inch ice, but this was the greatest thickness

reported. The temperature started to drop at noon yesterday, when the mercury hung about the thirty-five degree mark. It fell rapidly during the late afternoon and soon passed the freezing point. A number of snow flurries were reported.
