"How well you're looking lately, Alice," remarked Brown as he selected a cigar from the box and, lighting it, studied his wife through the smoke wreaths.

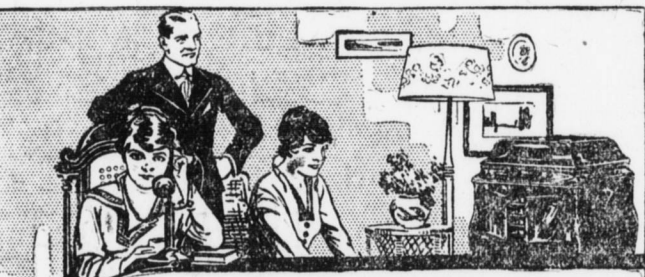
