REVISED COVENANT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS

THE TEXT of the revised covenant of the League of Nations, being considered in Paris to-day, follows with parenthetical insertions showing changes made in the covenant as originally drafted:

any dispute shall arise between them which they recognize to be suitable for submission to arbitration and which cannet be satisfactorily settled by diplomacy, they will submit the whole subject matter to arbitration.

Disputes as to the interpretation of a treaty, as to any question of international law, as to the existence of any fact which if established would constitute a breach of any international obligation, or as to the extent and nature of the reparation to be made for any such breach, are declared to be among those which are generally suitable for submission to arbitration. For the consideration of any such dispute the court of arbitration to which the case is referred shall be the court agreed upon by the parties to the dispute or stipulated in any convention existing between them.


