May:

Plant evergreens during the first part of May. Spray for all varieties of insects, those that chew, suck and bore. Spray for fungous disease. Commence cultivating and watering trees and shrubs. Senator Smith Presents Bill Reorganizing the Staff of the Department Today

The bill reorganizing the Public Grounds and Buildings Department to provide for the big constructive program was presented to the Senate to-day by Senator Frank A. Smith. Dauphin county.

The bill is an administration measure and increases the number of places and provides that the force may be enlarged as the Capitol Park is extended.
