

CITY LEAGUE OPEN BASEBALL SEASON TO-DAY; CARL BECK MAKES A GREAT RECORD

Allison Hill on Edge to Ogle the First Game

A band concert, flying circus, a chance to see Mayor Keister "shoot the pill," and a red-hot ball game between Reading and Rosewood will mark the opening of the Allison Hill Baseball League for the fifth successive season at the Seventeenth and Chestnut streets diamond beginning at 6 o'clock this evening.

Officials of the league have sent out the advance notice to Hill patrons to either get an early supper, or else bring their lunch with them. Those who want a seat in the remodeled bleachers will have to do more than merely "mosey around" this evening. They will have to "hot-foot it" to the grounds and "flop" quickly, or else be one of the several thousands who will line the field to see the action.

Promptly at 6 o'clock twenty pieces volunteered from the Community band of ten members, a concert that will continue throughout the game. In the meantime Lieutenant Hamor, from the Middletown Aviation Depot, will be pulling some stunts hundreds of feet above the diamond. He is the only person whom officials think is assured of an unobstructed view of the game from a real grandstand seat.

Then "His Honor," after several weeks' conditioning at the "Y," will toss out the first ball, and make appropriate remarks. To start the season without Mayor Keister would be the same as Reading Railway without Captain George Levan. And as a climax to the evening's entertainment, all of which is free of charge to the Hill fans, will come the big game between Reading and Rosewood.

To win that first game is the delight of both teams. "If we win that game it means the pennant," was the way one of the managers put it this morning. "Dick" Neblinger, former Boston American leaguer, will be the official in charge. His presence means a clean sport. Manager Pressler announces that Captain George Levan will step to the mound, with George Swartz doing the receiving.

Rosewood has uncertain: Manager Ross Sherk has Earl Killinger to catch, while the tossing will be performed by either "Lefty" Challenger, "Curly" Longenecker, "Ling" Johnson or Dressler. All are veteran twirlers.

The grounds are in better shape than ever, due to the efforts of the Harrisburg Park and Highway Departments. A record crowd is expected to ogle the most auspicious opening in the league's history.

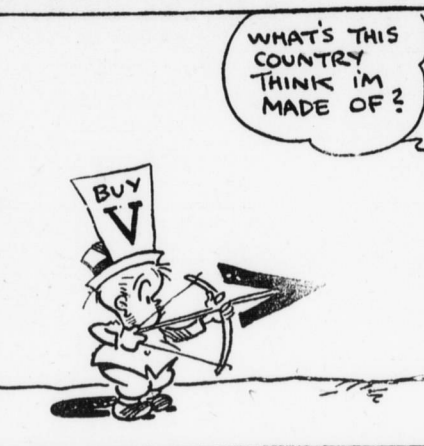
