Philadelphia, May 8.—A brother is arrayed against a sister in proceedings instituted in the common pleas court yesterday in a dispute over an interest in an estate valued at \$87,000. The action was filed by Joseph A. Gallagher against his sister, Hannah E. Gallagher, asking the court for a restraining order stopping the transfer of certain real estate decided to her by her brother. According to the bill filed, the share in dispute is worth about \$15,000. The estate was inherited from the parents of the litigants.

#### Famous Belgian Organist Coming Here For Recital Tuesday Evening, May 20

Charles Courboin, famous Belgian organist, now of Syracuse, N. Y., will give a recital in Bethlehem Lutheran church on the evening of Tuesday, May 20. He is to play at Lancaster on the evening of the previous day. Musicians of Harrisburg especially are interested in the coming recital, for the virtuoso has an extensive repertoire and plays entirely without the score.

Mr. Courboin formerly was organist in the famous Antwerp Cathedral and also played the great instrument in the ill-fated Rheims Cathedral. He still is municipal organist at Springfield, Mass., where he has attracted immense audiences by his marvelous work. A banquet will be tendered him by the Harrisburg Association of Organists following the recital in Bethlehem church.

#### Orders Court Rule on Liquor Licenses

Philadelphia, May 8.—The State Supreme Court has issued a writ on the appeal of applicants for retail, brewers' and distillers' licenses in Westmoreland county, that unless the court of that county has disposed of the matter on or before May 14 a rule will be granted requiring the court to show cause why a mandamus asked for shall not be awarded.

The applications have been held up by the Westmoreland county court because the two judges are divided on the license question.

**AUSTRIAN PEACE ENVOYS**

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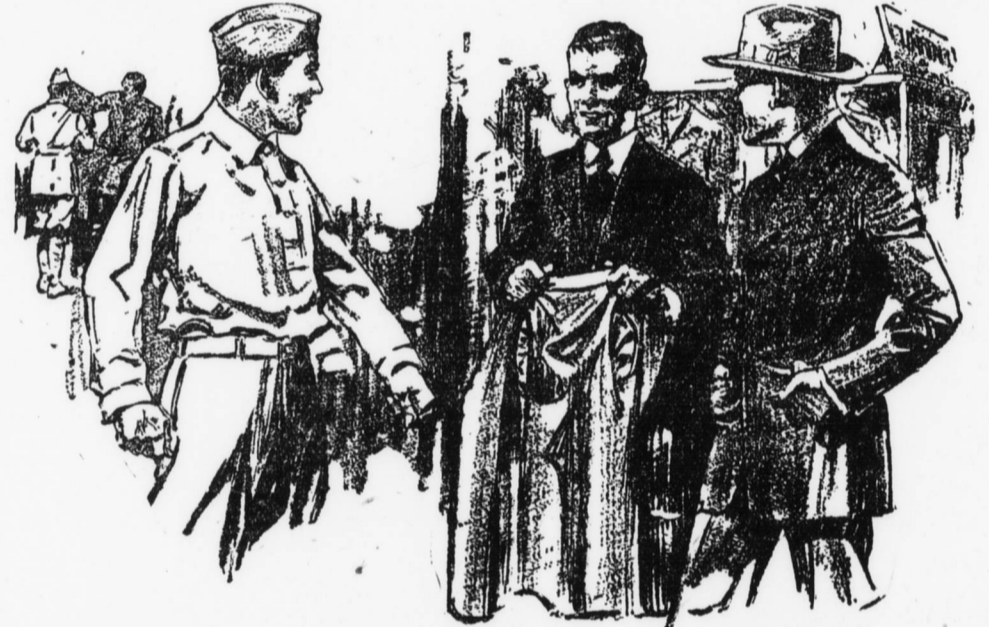
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
