

SAYS GERMANY WILL OPPOSE PART OF TREATY

Berlin Newspaper Comments on Allies' Stand on Danzig and Sarre

Berlin, May 9.—The National Zeitung publishes today its official standpoint the government expects to take regarding the peace terms.

The government, according to the newspaper, will refuse to sign any part of the treaty which provides for "oppression of Germany."

While the German peace plenipotentiaries are digesting the text of the long peace treaty handed them Wednesday and communicating with the Weimar government as to the demands made upon Germany by the Allied and associated powers,

Estimates have been made in Paris that 5,000,000,000 crowns will be demanded as indemnity from Austria-Hungary, in addition to the delimitation of frontiers.
