
**Compensation Tax Bill In** 

The bill drafted by the Attorney General requiring self-insurers un-der the compensation act to pay a State license of two per cent. based on payroll, was presented in the House to-day by Mr. Rarsey, Dela-ware, by unanimous consent. The bill is a duplicate of that intro-duced in the Senate Wednesday and as it was held to be a revenue raiser the measure came into the House under the constitutional require-ment that such bills originate in the lower branch of the Legislature. It is designed to furnish funds to operate the Compensation Bureau.


