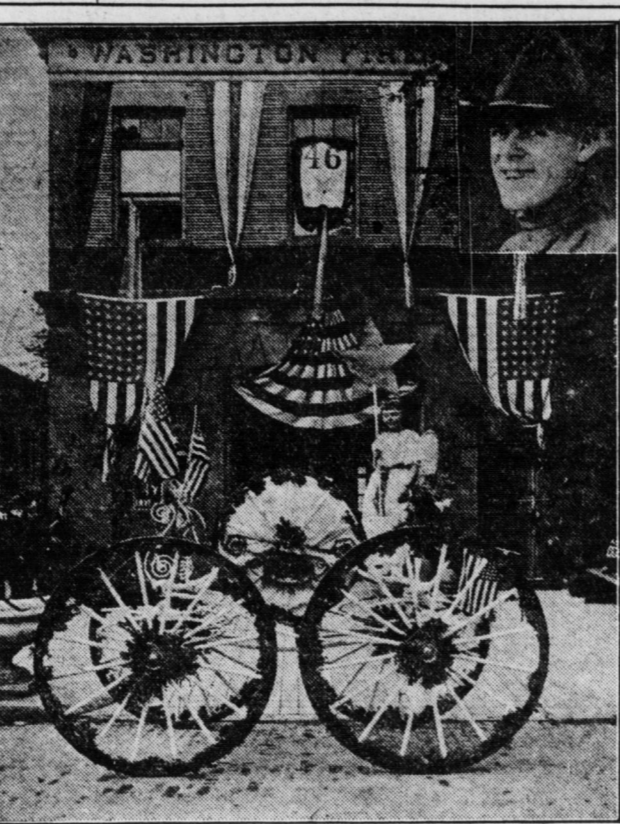

\$70,000 FIRE AT DALLASTOWN

Leaf Tobacco and Cigars Destroyed in Warehouse at Noell's Factory

Dallastown, Pa., May 14.—The first fire in this borough in a period of eight years yesterday morning about 2:30 o'clock, completely destroyed the warehouse of Edward Noell's cigar factory, entailing a loss estimated at \$70,000, partly covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown, and it had gained such headway when discovered that the firemen were unable to do more than protect the adjoining buildings.

The building was a frame structure 100 feet long, and was filled with leaf tobacco and finished cigars.
