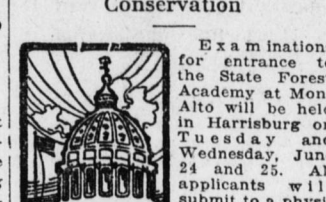

FORESTRY EXAM DATES GIVEN OUT

Chances For Young Men to Learn Some Practical Conservation



Examinations for entrance to the State Forestry Academy at Mont Alto will be held in Harrisburg on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 24 and 25. All applicants must submit to a physical examination at the office of the Department of Forestry on the 24th. The examination in scholarship will be held in the city High School building on the 25th, and only those applicants will be admitted who have already passed the physical examination.

All applicants must be citizens of Pennsylvania, not over 26 years of age and not under 18. The examination in scholarship will include the ordinary high school branches, algebra, plane and solid geometry, arithmetic, English grammar and composition. Physical examinations, civil government, physiology, history, reading, writing and spelling. An average grade of 75 per cent. must be attained to pass. No specimen applicants will be supplied.

Fifteen students who pass the examinations with the highest standing will be assigned to foresters on estates for two months of practical work in the woods. At the end of this period an additional test will be given. The ten men passing the test most satisfactorily will be admitted to the Forestry Academy on September 1st.

Price A General.—William G. Price, Jr., who returned from France recently as head of the 53rd artillery brigade, has been commissioned as major general of the National Guard of Pennsylvania, shortly to be constituted, as of May 16, the day following his honorable discharge from the United States Army. General Price will soon take up the details of the formation of the new Guard, into which will be incorporated the Reserve.

Major Jerr H. Leaman, deputy adjutant general, has been commissioned major and quartermaster and assigned to the First Brigade staff. Appointed in the Reserve Militia announced are: Hartley J. Zeigler, Franklin, captain; Marshall Gault, Oil City, first lieutenant; and Francis Black Hollister, Franklin, second lieutenant. Company 1, 3rd Infantry; Louis A. Bisbort, Philadelphia, first lieutenant; Company E, 1st Infantry; George M. Dudley, Ambler, first lieutenant; Company I, 1st Infantry.

General Price has been a member of the State's armed forces since May 24, 1886, when he joined a company of infantry and became a colonel in 1901. He served in the Spanish war as lieutenant colonel and became a brigadier general in 1910.

FIRE LOSSES \$290,000,000 New York, May 23.—Fire losses aggregating \$290,000,000—the greatest in any year except 1906, when the San Francisco earthquake and conflagration occurred, were reported for 1918 to the National Board of Fire Underwriters here today. The year also showed progress in bringing to bar persons responsible for incendiary fires, according to the report of the committee on incendiary fires and arson, which announced that 441 convictions had been obtained in 42 states.

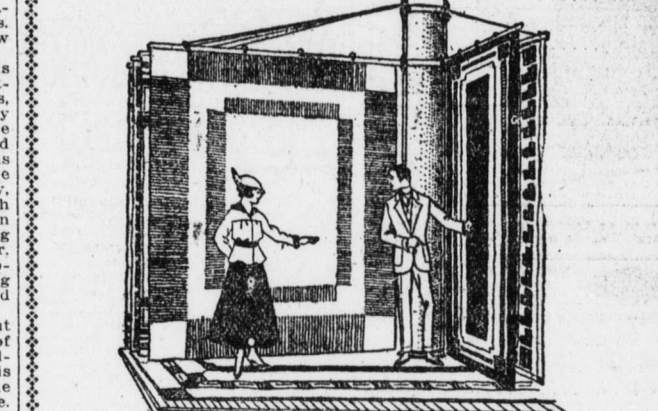

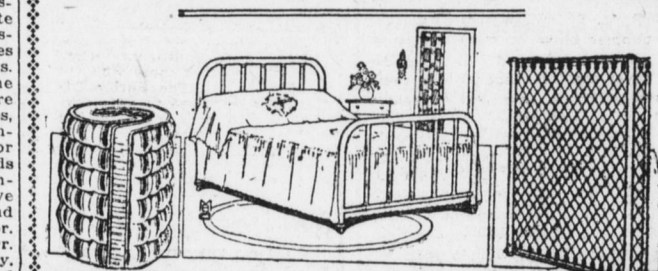

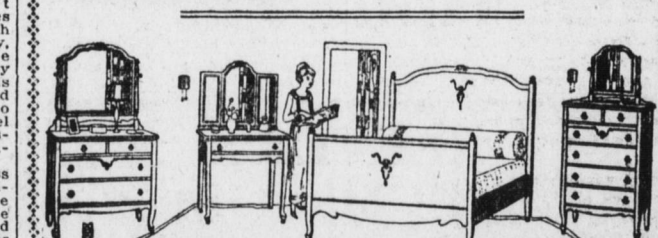
