Will Investigate Starch Mill Explosion

Washington, May 26.—The starch mill explosion at Cedar Rapids, lowa, in which a score of lives and 3,000,000 worth of property were lost, according to early press reports and which possibly could have been due to a dust explosion, is to be investigated immediately by chemical engineers of the United States Department of Agriculture, and with the strenuous efforts being put forth in Texas to prevent its spread, there working to devise appliance and methods for the prevention of disasters in mills where any kind of plant dust is present.

The devices and methods worked out for the prevention of grain-dust disasters have proved successful, according to officials of the Department's Bureau of Chemistry, and should be applied as soon as possible in all industrial enterprises producing inflammable dusts.




