RAZORS 10,000 YEARS OLD

RAZORS 10,000 YEARS OLD
Razors were in common use in ancient Greece and even centuries before that. In the Swisslake dwellings, which date back 10,000 years, have been found razors made from bronze. The ancient Greeks and Romans used similar amplement. The metal was hardened and had a beaten edge which could be made very sharp.

The prehistoric Mexicans are credited with making the best of ancient razors. These were glass affairs made from "obsidian," of volcanic origin. A cylindrical piece of volcanic glass served as the core, so to speak, from which thin flakes were skillfully chipped. The "chippings" resembled the modern razor blades of to-day. When the edge became dull all that was necessary was to chip off another flake, which made an easy shave simple.
