Austria agrees to accept the League of Nations covenant and the labor charter, to renounce all her extra European rights, to demobilize her whole naval and aerial forces to admit the right of trial by the Allied and associated powers of her nationals guilty of violating the law and customs of force and to accept detailed provisions similar to those of the German treaty as to economic relations and freedom of transit.

In the following summary part one of the treaty, containing the covenant of the League of Nations, and part twelve, containing the labor convention, are omitted as being identical with corresponding sections of the German treaty. Part six, dealing with prisoners of war and graves, and part eleven, with aerial navigation, are also identical except for the substitution of names, and are likewise omitted. Part thirteen of the German treaty, containing guarantees of execution is not particulated in the Austrian treaty.

and part tweive, containing the labor convention, are omitted as being identical with corresponding sections of the German treaty, Part six, dealing with prisoners of war and graves, and part eleven, with aerial navigation, are also identical except for the substitution of names, and are likewise omitted. The preamble is longer and more detailed than in the German summary and is as follows:
