

FRUIT BOXES ARE IN DEMAND

Crop This Year Will Require 9,000,000 Boxes, It Is Estimated

Seattle, Wash., June 6.—It is estimated that the fruit crop this year will require at least 9,000,000 boxes. Orders for shooks to make about four million fruit boxes for this season have been placed among twelve mills in the northwest.

On the Pacific coast, box manufacturers accept at a low price large quantities of the cheaper grade of spruce left from airplane stock and consequently they have an advantage over manufacturers in other sections.

100,000 Negroes to Be Represented at Cleveland Conference

Cleveland, June 6.—Mayor Harry L. Davis, of Cleveland, and Paul L. Fels, president of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, are to deliver addresses of welcome at the tenth anniversary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which opens in Cleveland on June 21 and will last through June 28.

"The Battlefield of America" is announced as the subject of the opening mass meeting on Sunday, June 22, which is to be addressed by Emmett J. Scott, special assistant to the Secretary of War. Moorfield Storey, of Boston, is to preside at this meeting and among the speakers are James Weldon Johnson and Dean William Pickens, of Morgan College, Baltimore.

Cottonseed Product Makers Are Released From War Licenses

New York, June 6.—The Food Administration announced today that the War Production Administration has signed a proclamation dated May 31, releasing from license "all persons, firms, corporations or associations engaged in the business of importing, manufacturing, storing or distributing cottonseed oil, cottonseed meal, cottonseed cake, cottonseed hulls, lard and lard substitutes and all other cottonseed products."

The Food Administration on May 31 announced that they had canceled all rules relating to the cottonseed industry and had withdrawn all price regulations and agreements regarding cottonseed and the products manufactured therefrom including lard substitutes, as from that date.

Although all rules and regulations were necessary for the President to issue a proclamation in order that the industries might be released from license.

Game Association Opposes McAllister For Federal Judgeship

New York, June 6.—The American Game Protective Association is in receipt of apparently reliable information to the effect that Frank McAllister, attorney general for the State of Missouri, has been recommended by Senator Reed for the Federal judgeship for the eastern district of Missouri.

The association has forwarded protests to President Wilson and A. Mitchell Palmer, attorney general, against the appointment, on the ground that Attorney General McAllister is himself a violator of Federal law and no waiting trial for shooting ducks on Stults Lake, Missouri, March 6, in violation of the Federal migratory bird treaty act.

Declares Railroad Losses Will Reach Billion by Year's End

Scranton, Pa., June 6.—Luther M. Walker, a Chicago attorney representing the National Association of Owners of Railroad Securities, told the Pennsylvania Bankers Association yesterday that before the end of 1919 the deficiency created by Government operation of railroads will total a billion dollars.

Mr. Walker said that at the end of last year the deficiency already had mounted up to \$250,000,000 and the cost of operation still is increasing enormously. He presented as a solution of the trouble the control of American railroad finances by a joint commission comprising the members of the Interstate Commerce Commission and eight representatives of the railroads with power to fix rates that would assure the railroads an earning of six per cent. on the invested capital.

Offers \$50,000 Prize For a Flight From California to Australia

Venice, Cal., June 6.—An offer of \$50,000 as prize money for aviators who will attempt a flight from this city to Australia, was made by Thomas H. Ince, motion picture producer.

To the first man to land on Australian soil, \$25,000 will be paid, the announcer said. The first aviator attempting, who, although failing to reach Australia, reaches the Hawaiian Islands, \$10,000 will be paid. In the case of those attempting the flight reaches the Hawaiian Islands, \$5,000 will be paid to the one making the best showing.

Buys 345,000 Tons of Steel For Autos

New York, June 6.—An order for 345,000 tons of steel has been placed with the United States Steel Corporation by the General Motors Corporation. This is one of the largest individual orders placed in the steel industry since the signing of the armistice, being nearly double the tonnage the order for steel rails placed by the Railroad Administration. For some time it has been asserted that the automobile industry was the heaviest consumer of steel.

The trade publications continue to report a betterment of conditions throughout the steel industry. The stabilization price figures continue to rule in the majority of cases where sales have been completed. It is understood that the stabilization prices govern the sale to General Motors by the Steel Corporation.

Food Rationing in Norway to End

Christiania, June 6.—Food rationing is expected to be abandoned this summer, as the importation of food for Norwegian use is now free and there are sufficient arrivals to meet the demand. The authorities however are in favor of keeping the rationing plan for sugar in force because it is feared that with a free market large quantities would be used for illegal private distillation of alcohol.

Drygoods Leader Condemns Silk Hose For Working Girls

Philadelphia, June 6.—The wearing of silk stockings by working girls on occasions other than special social affairs was condemned as a demoralizing influence by Norman E. Johnston, secretary of the southern Wholesale Drygoods Association, yesterday.

He spoke at the meeting of the National Association of Hose and Underwear Manufacturers being held in the Commercial Museum. Mr. Johnston said that the paying of high wages to working girls is having a demoralizing effect upon them.

He told the manufacturers that textiles would continue high in price for a time, and might even go higher, but that they would drop later.

New York, June 6.—That an era of prosperity prevails in the United States is shown by the fact that fewer failures occurred in April than in any other month in the history of American business, declares J. H. Tregoe, secretary and treasurer of the National Association of Credit Men.

Notwithstanding the bright outlook, Mr. Tregoe cautions merchants not to become careless or extravagant, but to continue thrift, economical practices that survived the war. Figures showing how businesses, such as building construction, have acquired a sudden and surprising impetus, were also set forth.
