WILSON ADVISES THOROUGH PROBE OF TREATY LEAK

President Cables Hitchcock Expression of Approval For Starting Senatorial Probe... FEELS BOUND IN HONOR... Says Possessors of Text Are Not Entitled to Advance Copy of Document... WORDS PREDICT ACTION... Committee Summons Bankers in Effort to Learn How Convention Reached New York

Washington, June 9.—President Wilson in a cablegram received to-day by Senator Hitchcock, Democrat, Nebraska, said he hoped the investigation by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on how copies of the Peace Treaty reached private interests in New York would "be most thoroughly prosecuted."

President's Message... The President's message, transmitted through the White House and read by Senator Hitchcock to the Foreign Relations Committee, follows: "Please convey following to Senator Hitchcock: 'I am heartily glad that you have demanded an investigation with regard to the possession of the text of Treaty by unauthorized persons. I have felt that it was highly undesirable officially to communicate the text of a document which is still in negotiation and subject to change. Anyone who has possession of the official English text has what he is clearly not entitled to have or to communicate. I have felt in honor bound to act in the same spirit and in the same way as the representatives of the other great powers in this matter, and am confident that my fellow-countrymen will not expect me to break faith with them. I hope the investigation will be most thoroughly prosecuted.'

Summons Witnesses... In his investigation of how copies of the Peace Treaty reached New York the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to-day subpoenaed Jacob Schiff, Thomas F. Lamont, H. P. Davison, Paul Warburg, J. P. Morgan and Frank A. Vanderlip.

Invites Polk to Testify... The committee also adopted unanimously a motion by Senator Fall, Republican, of New Mexico, inviting Acting Secretary of War Woodrow Wilson to appear as a witness and to take part in the inquiry by cross-examining witnesses and otherwise.

Middle Division Men Receiving Back Pay

Employees of the Middle division of the Pennsylvania railroad are receiving the first installment of their back pay. The increased wages date from January 1. Due to the delay in computing the amounts the men have not received any of the increase until to-day.

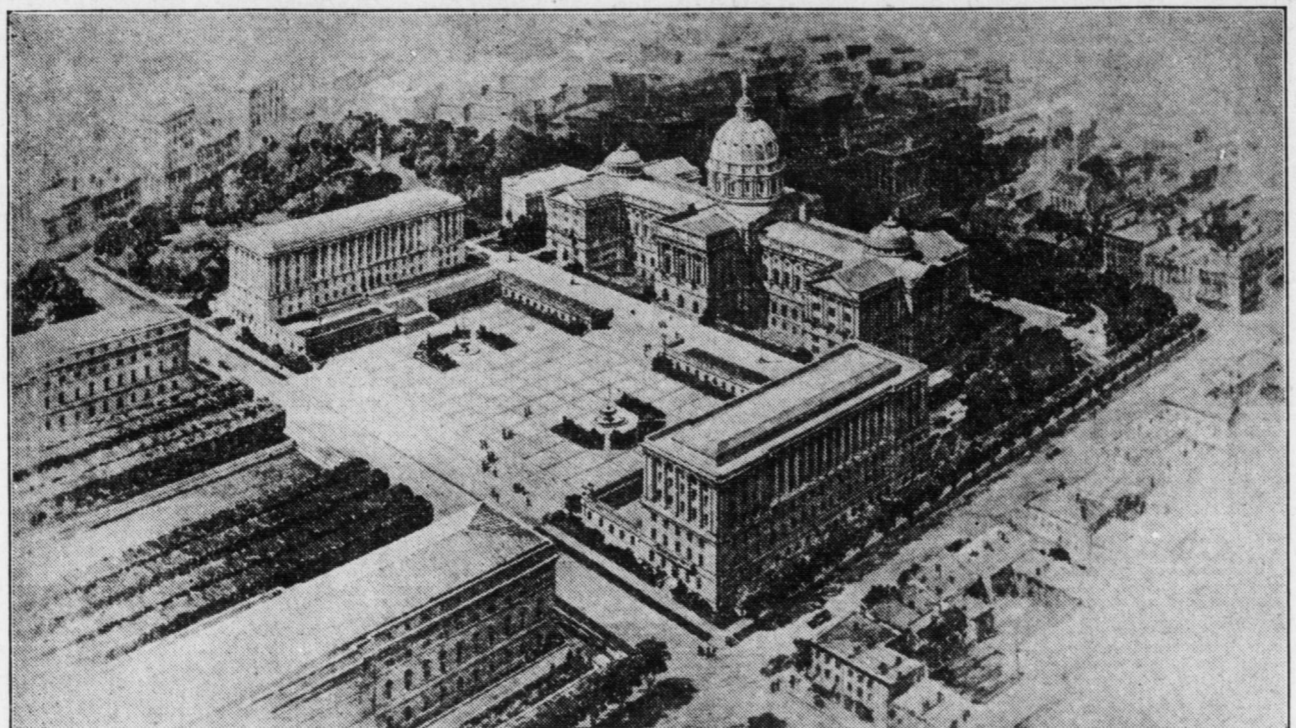
French Premier Sends Order to Hungary Attack on Neighbors Must End

GERMANY TO GET LEAGUE SEAT IF PEOPLES BEHAVE

Washington—A wheat production of 1,236,000,000 bushels this year, combining the winter wheat and spring wheat crops, was forecast to-day by the Department of Agriculture from the condition of the crop June 12.

STATE TO YIELD 34,713,000 BUSHELS OF WHEAT

Washington—The condition of winter wheat in Pennsylvania is 103 and the production is forecast at 34,713,000 bushels, according to the government crop report to-day.
