PNEUMONIA NOW BEFORE BOARD

Question Whether Compensation Can Be Claimed For Diseases

In opinions granting a series of new hearings the State Compensation Board has made some interesting statements regarding a determination of the compensation law in Pennsylvania, indicating that a question raised will have important bearing on future decisions. One of the most far-reaching is in the case of McNulty vs Lackawanna Railroad, Scranton, in which the opinion in ordering a new hearing says: The claimant "has also attempted to draw an analogy between the invasion of the human system by the germ of pneumonia and that of anthrax and claims compensation on the principle that her husband having contracted pneumonia upon the premises of the defendant because of the condition thereof, that this disease, if there contracted, is that unexpected and unforeseen event which the courts have said constitute an accident under the workmen's compensation act of 1915. The immediate pathological and physiological must be found as facts, together with other necessary and material findings. New hearings are ordered to determine questions of dependency in Wilde vs. Pennsylvania Railroad, Philadelphia, and Caeti vs. Cambria Steel Co., Johnstown, in which the earnings of a deceased son enter; and for further information in Reiley vs. Erie Railroad, Susquehanna; Gringee vs. Rutherford & Mignatti, Philadelphia; Thomas vs. Lackawanna Railroad, Scranton; Moran vs. Pittsburgh Terminal Railroad, Pittsburgh.

In Artley vs. Indiana county, it is held that the county must pay compensation to the widow of Constable Artley, of Blairsville, because he was shot and killed while trying to make an arrest. It is held that the constable had been duly elected by the people, had given bond and was acting under control of authorities. The manner of his selection to the office does not enter into the case. In Turner vs. Rainey, Uniontown, compensation is given a widow for death of her sixteen-year-old son who died from bone disease caused by a bale of hay falling against his leg.

Many at Funeral—Senate and House, State government and the bench were represented at the funeral of Senator James M. Campbell, at Mercer, on Saturday. It was the largest funeral ever held in the county and the Senators marched with the mace of the upper chamber at their head.

Action On Auto Bills—The final amendments to the Dithrich and Cox automobile bills are in hand and it is expected they will reach the Governor by the end of the week.

Increases Filed—The Public Service Commission has given notice that the following certificates of notification for increases of capital stock and debt have been filed: Pennsylvania Utilities Co., Easton, bonds \$471,000 and \$110,000; Citizens Light, Heat and Power Co., Johnstown, bonds \$74,000; Penn Public Service Co., Philadelphia, bonds \$261,000; Steubenville, East Liverpool and Beaver Valley Traction Co., Midland, bonds \$1,500,000; Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railway, Ridgway, bonds \$205,000, \$204,000, \$142,000, \$1,700,000 and \$1,647,000; Eastern Pennsylvania Railways Co., Pottsville, bonds \$42,000.

Bridges Approved—The State Water Supply Commission has approved plans for county bridges for Lackawanna, Schuylkill and Susquehanna counties and for various changes in public drainage system at Erie.

Army Plans—Plans of the State Army Board for construction of additional armories for the reorganized National Guard will have to be curtailed in view of the fact that less than \$200,000 for construction has been reported to the House of Representatives. The State has received offers of free sites for buildings which would cost twice the size of the appropriation reported.

Case to Go Higher—Judge James McF. Carpenter, at Pittsburgh, dismissed an injunction proceeding brought by the Public Service Commission against Peter C. Jobe, of McKeesport, for operating a jitney between McKeesport and Elizabeth without securing a license. The case will be appealed to the Superior Court and will test the right of the Commission to bring suits in other courts than that of Dauphin county. The contention was that the defendant in the case is not within the jurisdiction of Dauphin county court, and unless a suit can be maintained in Allegheny county by the Commission is not within the jurisdiction of the Commission.

Cresswell Pleased—Brigadier General Charles T. Cresswell, the brigade commander, is frankly and unqualifiedly pleased with the results of the week's work at Mount Gretna camp. "We started out to emulate the former National Guard in the Reserve Militia," he said. "We no longer do so. We have surpassed them. The results of this week's work will show up best when we have the brigade in camp in July, and these officers have their companies and platoons to handle."

Case Dismissed—The Supreme Court has ordered dismissed the petition of applicants for hotel, brewers' and distillers' licenses in Westmoreland county, the lower court having acted as directed by the Supreme Court writ of mandamus.

Claims Settled—The claims of the families of the men killed in the Wilkes-Barre mine explosion have been virtually settled. The State Compensation Board has announced that most of the contracts have been approved. This sets a record for the State compensation authorities.

Attended Meeting—Adjutant General Frank D. Beary spent the weekend in New York in company with Major General W. G. Price, discussing the National Guard reorganization.

Moyer a Speaker—Gabriel H. Moyer, of the Auditor General's Department, was the speaker at the Lebanon Odd Fellows' memorial yesterday.

Again Change in Law—A. C. Birelow, active in the more sheep movement, is circulating pictures and circulars against any change in the dog law. He contends that any modification of the law would menace the sheep industry.

Collins Made Address—Deputy Attorney General Emerson Collins was Flag Day speaker at the Pottsville exercises.

SNOW AND HEAT DELAY TRAINS

Although handicapped by the fact the session did not open until May 19, there is reason to believe that House and Senate will be able to accomplish the huge task of getting the appropriation bills passed by July 1, the date when the new fiscal year begins.

Working in conjunction with the Senate leaders, the decision of the House leaders was to dispose of these vast appropriation measures with this extraordinary speed in order to give the Senate time to deal with them, send them to conference, and pass them finally before July 1. In order to carry out the program, the House will for some days
