DID BIG WORK

Women Fed 198,064 Men During War and Aid-the Wounded

From October, 1917, until June, 1919, the canteen committee of the Harrisburg Chapter of the American Red Cross met 729 trains, served 198,064 men, among whom were 20,948 wounded soldiers. A report of the work of the canteen is to be made by Mrs. Francis J. Hall, chairman of the committee, who is in Philadelphia attending a meeting of workers. Praise for the co-operation of local Pennsylvania railroad employes is given by Mrs. Hall in the report.
