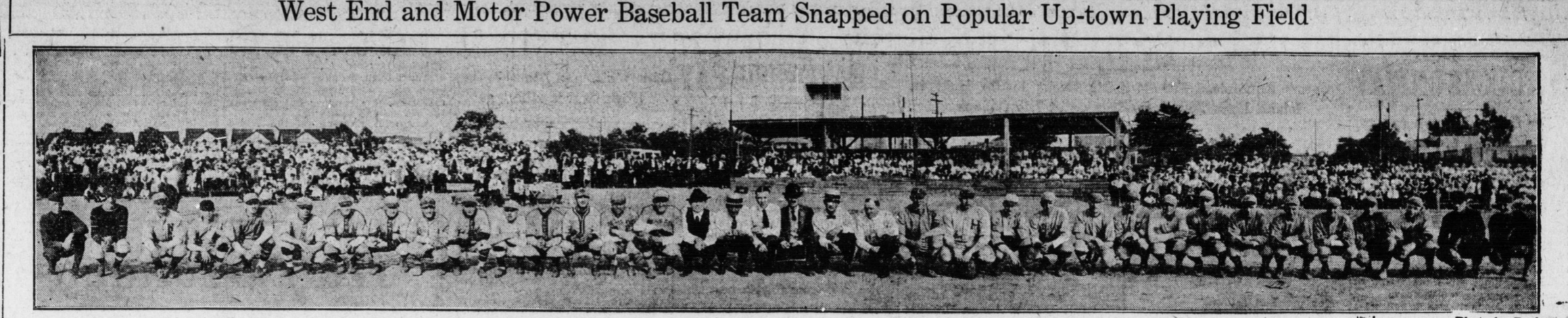

AN ORDINANCE To authorize the paving and curbing of Zarker street from the Borough of Steeple to Twentieth street, and providing for the payment of the cost thereof. Section 1.
