GERMAN RAIL STRIKE FAILS

Berlin, June 26. - Up until 4 o'clock this afternoon the strike of railroad workers failed to show signs of spreading. The Federation of Railworkers, the membership of which is 400,000, is opposing the strike and has called upon the workers not to desert themselves or be "misled by political agitators or guilty of plunging the country into economic chaos."
