



CAPITOL PARK EXTENSION WORK STARTS SEPT. 1

Board of Grounds Aims at Beginning Bridge Construction by That Time

OFFICE BUILDING, TOO Plans and Specifications for Great Development Are Well Under Way

Work on the State street memorial bridge, the office building to be erected in the Capitol Park extension and the beautification of the extension zone by September 1, is the aim of the Board of Public Grounds and Buildings.

The Board of Public Grounds and Buildings is completing as rapidly as possible details and specifications for the bridge and as soon as these are completed bids will be advertised.

Park Extensions With regard to the Park Extension developments, the terraces and the public building will be started about the same time, late this summer.

The bridge approaches and pylons are to be built in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by Arnold W. Brunner and J. E. Griener.

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Harrisburg will be charged with the roadway and sidewalks, the protection of the present line of State street and the preserving, protecting and policing of the bridge.

Under the terms of the other bill the Commissioners of Public Grounds and Buildings are authorized to erect, construct and complete ready for furnishing an office building in Capitol Park and to provide for the necessary filling, grading and terracing in connection with the building.

This building is to be erected in the Capitol Park extension, the 29 acres which have been acquired by the State on the east side of the Capitol building.

Harrisburg is co-operating with the State in the beautification of the capital city. The city will see that all buildings abutting on Capitol Park will be erected in harmony with the State's plans.

HAGUE DECLARES EX-KAISER'S SON STILL IN EXILE

Former Crown Prince Hasn't Fled to Germany; Expects to After Peace

The Hague, June 27.—Frederick William Hohenzollern, the former German crown prince, whose escape from Holland to Germany had been reported, was still at his residence on the Island of Wieringen in Zuyder Zee this morning, it was officially announced here this afternoon.

London, June 27.—"After peace is signed, I will return to Germany to live on my estates in Silesia and perform my duties as a landowner," said the former German crown prince in an interview last week at Wieringen, according to a Brussels dispatch to the Daily Mirror.

CHILD IS FOUND IN PARK AFTER ALL-NIGHT HUNT

Eight-Year-Old Girl Taken in Reservoir by Unidentified Man

DAZED FROM EXPERIENCE Family Physician Believes Child Will Recover Readily From the Shock

Sleeping throughout the night in a small outbuilding in Reservoir Park, to which she was taken last night by an unidentified man, little 8-year-old Margaret Bartolet, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Bartolet, 1264 Market street, was found in the park this morning by Elias M. Hassler, caretaker, who returned her to her home.

She had been persuaded to go on an errand for the man after having been sent to mail a letter at the sub-postoffice in Thirteenth street near Market. He had been unable to find a messenger to go on an errand to "his girls' home," he said.

Child Falls Asleep Taking the child by the hand, he led her in the direction of Reservoir Park and took her to one of the outbuildings there. Her remaining with her for some time, he left to get a drink of water for himself and one for the girl, he said, but he did not return and the child, after crying for some time, fell asleep.

Following the announcement that the child was missing last evening, a large party of searchers was formed and scoured Reservoir Park in every place it was thought the child might be. The outbuilding in which the child had stayed, is one of the few places in the park which they had neglected to look into.

German Troops Reach Hamburg to Put Down Disorder; Disarm Foes

Washington, June 27.—Congress today gave final approval to repeal of the daylight saving law in the adoption of the conference report on the annual agricultural appropriation bill to which the repeal measure is attached.

Berlin, June 27.—The German government troops, ordered to Hamburg to suppress disorders there, reached the suburbs of the city this morning. The troops ordered the immediate cessation of hostilities, the release of all prisoners and the delivery of weapons.

Poland Granted Right to Expel Galicia Rebels

Paris, June 27.—The Council of Four has granted Poland permission to use General Haller's army or any of its other troops in restoring quiet to Eastern Galicia and driving outlaws out of the country.

The armistice between Poland and Ukraine ended June 21, when officers representing Simon Petlura, the Ukrainian peasant leader, advised Polish generals that Petlura had not authorized the negotiations which resulted in the armistice.

Calvin Graham Killed by Charged Trolley Wire

Calvin Graham, 19, a motorman on the White Hill trolley line, was electrocuted last night while at work. Graham, whose home was at Neville, stepped on a trolley to pull down a wire that had fallen over the trolley line.

Chicken Thief to Be Paroled July 1, if the Nation Is Dry

Hazleton, Pa., June 27.—Pleading guilty to-day before Judge Fuller to the theft of chickens which he said he sold for liquor, Walter Beers, of Freeland, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 and \$25 for stealing the fowl and to undergo imprisonment for six months if the country goes dry July 1, however, he is to be paroled.

Englishman Says Bodily Ills May Be Cured by Faith Alone

Hopes to Lead Revival of Healing Along Apostolic Lines

A movement is afoot among a number of prominent laymen of several denominations to bring to Harrisburg James Moore Hickson, who came from London to America to heal the sick by prayer and the laying on of hands.

It is understood that an invitation will be extended next week to Mr. Hickson, whose religious work has created a great stir in Boston and New York. Those interested in having the "healer" coming here to-day they do not want to be known until they have some assurance of success.

The healer said that his purpose is best explained as the revival of the ministry of healing in the church of Christ along apostolic lines; to exercise the power which he gave to His church for the spiritual and bodily salvation of men, and also to spread and deepen spiritual life and thought.

Mr. Hickson is a layman of the Episcopal Church. He is 40 years old, and for the last 18 years has been spreading his creed through England. He arrived in Boston the first week in April. After leaving Philadelphia he intends visiting other cities, and is planning to go to France and Belgium. When winter comes he expects to be in India. In 1921 he plans to lead a great healing mission to the Holy Land.

Council of Four Completes Plans For Attaching Names to Treaty at 3 P. M. Saturday; President Meets Writers

SAYS GOOD-BY TO AMERICAN NEWSPAPER MEN AT CAPITAL

PARIS, June 27.—Plans were completed by the Council of Four to-day for the signing of the Peace Treaty at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. No official statement, however, was issued by the Council. President Wilson received American newspaper correspondents at the Hotel De Crillon at 2 o'clock this afternoon and said his good-bys to them.

According to the advices received by the American authorities here, Ministers Mueller and Bell left Berlin in the greatest secrecy on a special train, fearing an attempt on their lives.

Dr. Hermann Mueller, German Foreign Minister, and Dr. Johannes Bell, Minister of the Colonies, are now on their way from Berlin to Versailles to sign the Treaty of Peace, having passed through Cologne this morning. They are expected to reach their destination on Saturday morning and arrangements are making for the signing of the Treaty at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

An official dispatch from the Hague this afternoon gave the information that the former German crown prince still was at his residence on the Island of Wieringen in the Zuyder Zee, this morning.

Washington—President Wilson advised the Senate to-day through the State Department that he was considering sending another commission to Poland to investigate reports of Jewish massacres. He is to confer with Hugh Gibson, American minister to Poland, before arriving at a definite decision.

New York — Seven brothers, Abraham, Charles, Davis, Elias, George, John and Joseph Solomon, were to-day sentenced by United States Judge Knox to serve two years each in the Atlanta penitentiary for swindling merchants out of goods valued at more than half a million dollars.

HUNGARIAN UPRISING PUT DOWN

Berlin—A counter-revolutionary movement in Hungary, during which a monitor on the Danube was seized by the anti-government forces, has been put down.

LIQUOR LAWS TO COME OUT

Washington—The House Judiciary Committee to-day voted 17 to 2 to report out all prohibition enforcement legislation in one general bill, with the war-time enforcement measure set down as part one.

FORMER EMPEROR CHARLES ILL

Geneva—It is reported from Prangins, where former Emperor Charles of Austria is staying that the condition of his health is causing anxiety. He has not left the house for a week and is being attended by a Swiss doctor. Former Empress Zita is acting as a nurse for her husband.
