

Hershey House to Close Monday After Many Years of Service in the City

With the closing of the Hershey House next Monday night, one of the oldest hotels in the city will discofitinue business. To-day the furnishings in thirteen rooms in an adjoining building, which had been rented for hotel purposes, were disposed of at public sale by D. U. Hershey, the present proprietor.

Last night the diningroom closed, and next Monday night the bar and the hotel will close. The property has been purchased by S. A. Greene, and it is understood that Philadelphia businessmen are bidding for the location for a store.

The Hershey House was started many years ago and h April, 1881, Harry E. Hershey, father of D. U. Hershey, first began to conduct the hotel. In 1900 his son took over the management and has been in charge ever since.
