Carlisle, Pa., July 12.—Plant dis ease will cut the wheat and oats yields in Cumberland county about twenty per cent., a survey made by twenty per cent., a survey made by the Cumberland County Farm Bureau and an expert of the United States Department of Agriculture disclose. A disease known as the wheat scab has been found in practically every, wheat field in Cumberland county and the infection in some cases reaches twenty per cent. Loose smut and other diseases also combine to cut the yield.
