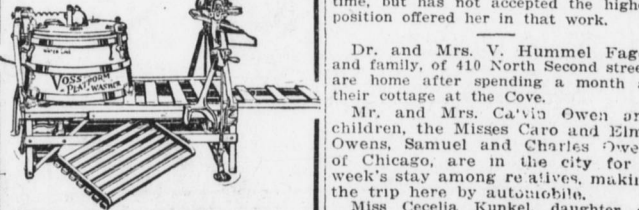
The McGann-Doherty Marriage in New York
