Mr. McCormick said he did not look upon the League of Nations as an organization guaranteeing perpetual peace. He said he realizes the millenium is at hand, that the league and treaty are not perfect but said they are the best instruments that could be devised to meet the situation and that without them chaos would follow in Europe. It was here that he advocated the return of businessen and urged the adoption of the treaty to the end that the millions of Europe may get back to their jobs as soon as possible and begin the production of the goods for which all Europe is crying.

"Men who have been over there know that Europe is prostrate and they know that peace through the treaty and the league is the sovereign remedy for the condition.

"Wipe out the war boards and the war agencies, get rid of government control, turn the business of the country over to its businessmen and the end of the trouble will be in sight," he said.

He said it was inspiring to see the faith the smaller nations have in American ideals and paid a high tribute to the American soldiers in France. He closed with an appeal for the development here in America and in Harrisburg of such a domacracy as would set an example for the war-weary struggling new nations of Europe who are looking toward the United States fo inspiration. His speech was well received and many of thse present stopped to shake hands at the close of the meeting.
