Worthington is under indictment in the Federal Court for violation of the postal laws. Federal Judge Landis, who is on a vacation in Michigan has been notified of Worthington's apprehension and is expected to return to Chicago.

Guards entered O'Brien's cell and everything by which he could harm himself was taken away. A guard was then stationed outside the cell to prevent him from attempting suicide.

O'Brien has broken down, jail officials say, and rapidly is losing the nerve and bravado which characterized him when he made his confessions of the crime and told tales designed to stamp him as a "bad man." He recanted last night his declaration that he killed Mrs. Wilkins.
