siderably and a shortage of many millions of tons looks probable. My advice to consumers is to buy NOW while they can get a selection and delivery. I feel bound to say that, as I see the situation, we are likely to experience a coal famine in the Fall."

> Scarcity of coal is no Myth. Today in the midst of the summer season coal is difficult to obtain. For a period of several weeks we have been "out of" two sizes of coal at one of our yards. During June not 40 per cent of our orders were filled by the mine operators.

> Coal cannot be produced and held in huge quantities at the mines awaiting the convenience of buyers. It must be moved as fast as produced—it is impossible to mine next winter the coal that should "come out" today.

> Do not think we are alarmists. The situation is indeed critical. When cold weather comes and you cannot get sufficient fuel, do not say you were not notified of the importance of buying coal in summer.
