until formal notice is given that the medals are ready. "The distribution of Victory Medals is delayed," the statement reads. "In view of the large number of applications now being received, attention is called to the fact that Victory Medals will not be ready for issue for several months. The method of distribution has not been

determined, but it will probably follow the general scheme now being used for the distribution of the Victory Button. Wide publicity will be given to the adopted scheme when medals are ready for issuance. Applications for medals should not be made until that time."
