
Must Pay Ex-Wife \$4 a Week to Support His 4-Year-Old Son

Major Seelye Expects to Come Home Soon

Farley Gannett, of Gannett, See-lye & Fleming, received a letter to-day from Major Theodore E. See-lye, dated July 6, from Paris, where he has been connected with the educational commission since early in March

Major Seelye was in the 30th Division and was at or near the front July 13 to November 11, receiving a citation for his services. After the armistice was signed, he was made chief of transporta-tion on a section of the mission to Belgium, and had charge of the valuation of the damage done by the Germans to the railroads, highways, canals, harbors and coast in Bel-gium, involving some two billion dollars' worth of damages. Major Seelye expected to sail for America about the middle of July, unless he was retained to work on the Liquidation Commission, which is disposing of the American prop-erty in France.
