

# FIGHT WITHOUT SHOES, RIFLES OR HEAVY GUNS

## 20,000 Scantly Equipped Russians Driving Back 80,000 Bolsheviks

Paris, July 25. — Twenty thousand Russians, many of them barefoot and without rifles and unsupported by heavy artillery, compose the Northern Russian army, whose front extends from the Finnish coast to Pskov and which is driving back towards Petrograd a Bolshevik army four times as large, according to reports received here from officers of the American relief administration on the scene.

These officers are working part of the time under Bolshevik fire endeavoring to provision and to provide medical supplies to this new army, made up chiefly of Russians under prominent old-time Russian leaders. Officers and soldiers alike are clamoring for tanks, which have been promised them by the Allies and with the help of which they express confidence that they could reach Petrograd speedily.

**White Bread Wins Them**  
The reports of the provisioning show that after that arrival in some sectors early in July of white flour supplied by the Americans many of the Bolsheviks succumbed to the lure of white bread and joined their enemies.

The improved conditions and the better food now supplied to the northern army is cheering up the men, whose morale is reported high

as compared with that of the Bolsheviks opposing them. The latter, according to reports now have to be kept on the front lines by threatening them with their own machine gun fire. Scoury is said to be prevalent.

There is sufficient American food available in the Gulf of Finland to supply Petrograd and its suburbs for three months, but the lack of co-ordination of Allied assistance to the Northern Russian army and to the Estonians operating in conjunction with it is declared to be preventing the movement up Petrograd from progressing without sufficient speed to expect relief for many months.

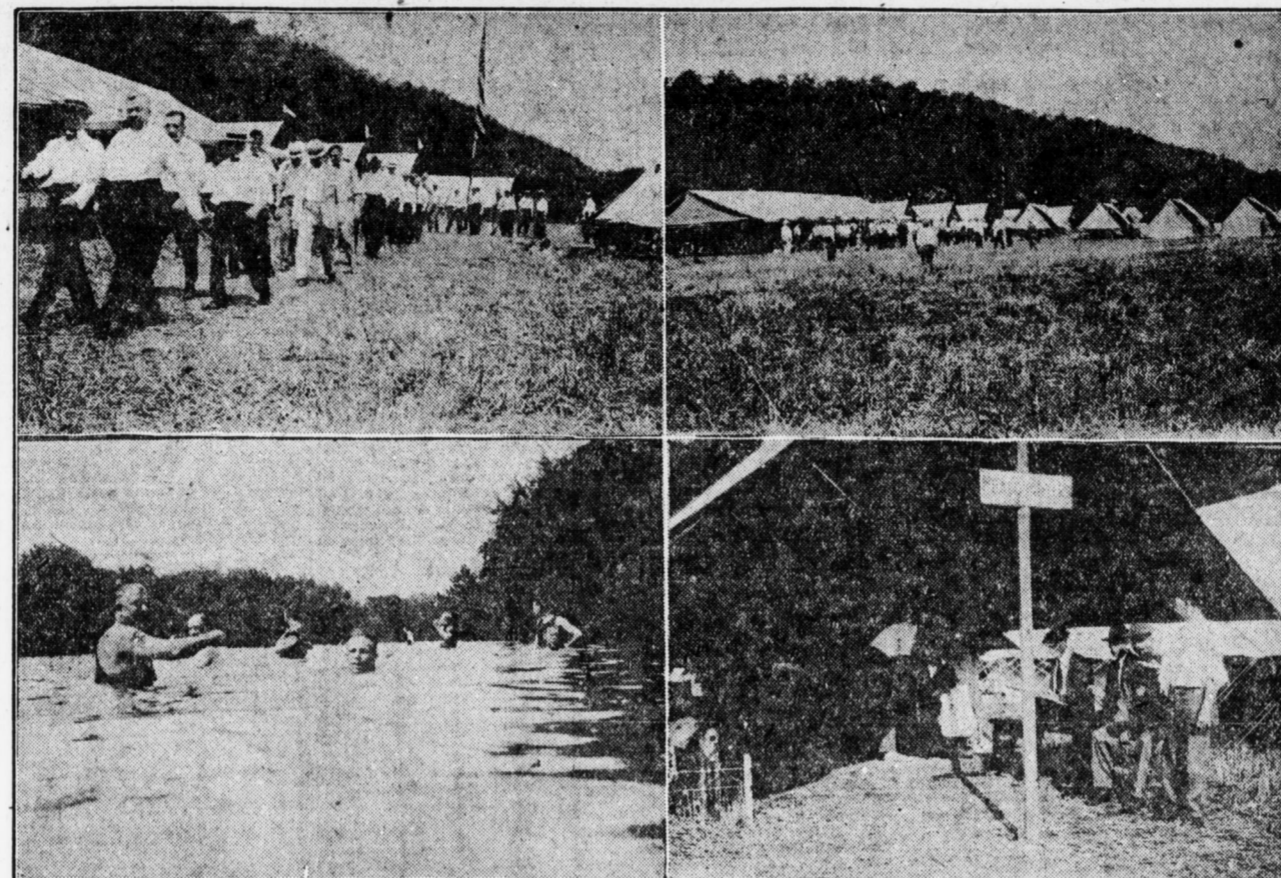
which took over the first mortgage bonds. One of the results of the building of the great auditorium at Pittsburgh was an immediate increase of the membership of Zemo Temple, so that the revenues from fees and dues was at once greatly increased, making the maintenance of the auditorium and the reduction of the bonded debt a comparatively easy matter. Already the Pittsburgh fraternity is contemplating the acquisition of a suitable convention hall with a view to the building of the auditorium.

**Need Is Urgent**  
In submitting its report the committee will point out the urgent need of a great auditorium for Harrisburg and the insistent demand for a suitable convention hall with the increasing convention activities of the city make necessary. It is believed the financial plan adopted by the Pittsburgh fraternity for the purposes of Zemo Temple with some slight modifications. The auditorium of the "Smoky City" is located in the suburbs where ample space was available and where sufficient parking facilities for automobiles could be obtained. It is the belief of the Harrisburg committee, which met at the Pen-Harris Hotel, Pittsburgh auditorium, that it would be unwise to locate the proposed hall in any central section for the reason that great conventions would necessarily compel provision for parking hundreds of automobiles. The committee suggests as an obvious need parking facilities in connection with such a building.

When Syria Temple erected its big auditorium in Bigelow Boulevard, about five miles from the business center of Pittsburgh, its membership was about the same as the present numerical strength of Zemo Temple, and with the rapid growth of the Harrisburg organization Colonel Covert and those who are associated with him and who agree with him on the immediate need of such a building believe that the undertaking is entirely feasible from every standpoint and will provide for another great need of the city following the achievement of the community effort in the building of the Pen-Harris Hotel.

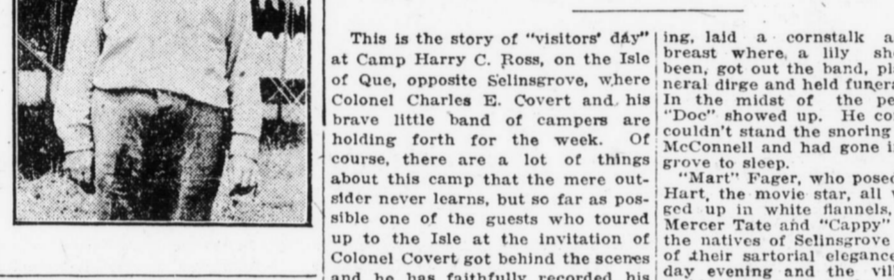

# VISITORS' DAY AT COVERT'S KAMP WAS GRAND HILARIOUS OCCASION

## Camp Harry C. Ross, on the Isle of Que, Scene of Happy Reunion of Campers First Time Since Start of War



This is the story of "visitors' day" at Camp Harry C. Ross, on the Isle of Que, opposite Selinsgrove, where Colonel Charles E. Covert and his brave little band of campers are holding forth for the week. Of course, there are a lot of things about this camp that the mere outsider never learns, but so far as possible one of the guests who toured up to the Isle at the invitation of Colonel Covert got behind the scenes and he has faithfully recorded his findings.

In the first place, the camp is properly named, for it is just as charming as its sponsor, Harry C. Ross, who had the surprise of his life when he got into camp Monday morning and saw his name in big letters on a banner swung across the entrance of the camp. Everybody up at camp calls him "Boss" Ross and he never resents the soft impeachment. He is one of the liveliest figures in camp, despite the fact that he carried a saber in many a gallant cavalry dash in the Civil War and by ordinary methods of computing age ought to be an old man. "Hello, young fellow," was the greeting one guest gave yesterday and he responded cheerfully, "That's me."

Another outstanding figure of the camp is Colonel Covert himself. Every summer, barring that of last year when the war interfered, the Colonel has had a big camp on the Isle of Que, which is just opposite his boyhood home between Zemo Creek and the river. Each summer he gathers about him a party of his personal friends, made up mostly of members of Zemo Temple, Mystic Shriners, of which he is the potentate, and other gentlemen. Each year he makes the auditorium available for many purposes. Chestnut street hall, which has been under lease to Zemo Temple for some years, has already become too small for its uses and more room must be provided.

The undertaking is of great interest not only to the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in this jurisdiction, but also to the general public which recognizes the need of such a building. During the war the local temple originated many patriotic ceremonies in harmony with the spirit of the time, but carefully avoided the purely social and light programs which occasionally characterize the ceremonial sessions of the fraternity as not being in keeping with the war period.

It is believed that an auditorium such as is proposed with a large seating capacity and the appointments of a modern convention hall will do much for Harrisburg and attract hither hundreds of large assemblages which cannot now be accommodated.

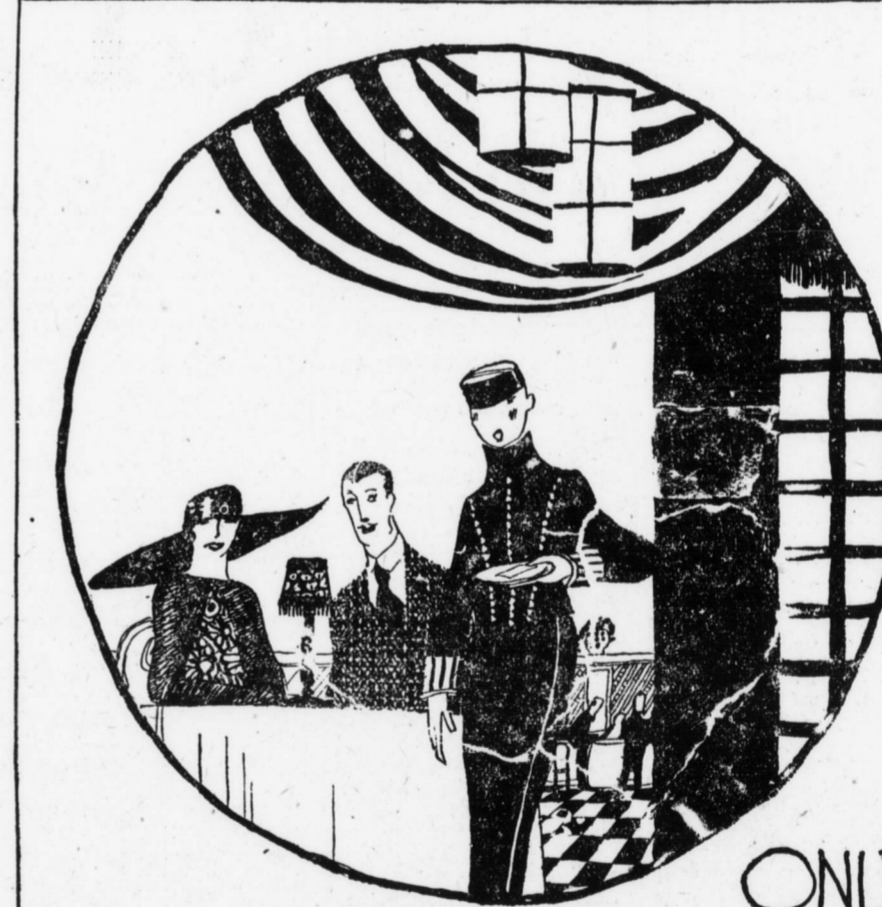
