

He was a sturdy right-hander and took a turn in the box with Tim Keefe, Mickey Welch and Ed Crane. Six years later Charles Webb Murphy, owner of the Cubs, suddenly released Johnny Evers from the management and appointed O'Day, who had had a previous experience as leader of the Reds. O'Day withdrew from the Cubs' management after one year and returned to the National League's umpire staff. He is doing excellent work in this capacity and is perfectly happy.


