28th, With 732 Men Taken Captive, Leads All of U. S. Divisions

Philadelphia, July 30.—The 28th Division—Pennsylvania's "Own" — had more of its men taken prisoners by the Germans than any other American division in France.

A statement, issued by the War Department to-day, shows that eighteen officers and 714 enlisted men of the Iron Division were removed from the fighting through capture by the Germans.

In all, 4,480 Americans, 316 of whom were officers, were captured by the enemy.

The 26th Division, made up of the New England National Guard, was second only to the 28th in the num-ber of men lost by capture, eighteen officers and 428 men of that organi-zation having been forced to sur-render.
