## **Twenty Lose Their** Lives When Ship Sinks After Collision at Sea Mixed Gasoline With

By Associated Press. Halifax, Aug.7—Twenty per-sons are believed to have lost their lives when the Tern schooner Gallia was sunk last night in a collision with the British steamer War Witch. The schooner is reported to have carried a crew of at least fifteen and possibly a dozen passengers and only seven survivors are named in wireless messages from the steamer. The collision occurred close to St. Pierre and is supposed to have been due to the heavy fog which prevailed in that locality for some days.
