The two teams have alternated in the lead almost from the start of the season, when Brooklyn set the pace for a short time. Moran's men, who have not encountered a losing streak, have been more successful than their eastern rivals during the past few weeks, gradually widening the gap between first and second places. To wipe out the Red's lead, McGraw's men must win five of the six contests. The Reds and Giants have broken even in twelve games, in which the latter outscored their opponents 42 runs to 36.
