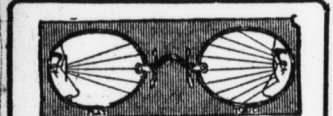


Ream Family Reunion Today at Reservoir

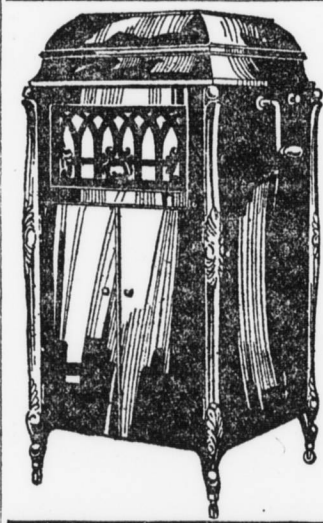
