Lipton Will Send Shamrock to America For Final Races

London, August 20.—Since his return to London from America, Sir Thomas Lipton has set about the task of completing the arrangements for next year's contest for the America's cup in earnest says the Evening World. The most important decision so far arrived at, Sir Thomas told a writer in that periodical, is to send the 23-meter Shamrock to America early next year to act as a trial boat in the tuning-up spins of the challenger, Shamrock IV. Asked who would have charge of the British boat, Sir Thomas replied W. P. Burton had consented to all the challenger in the race for the America's cup, and also take charge of the 25-meter Shamrock.

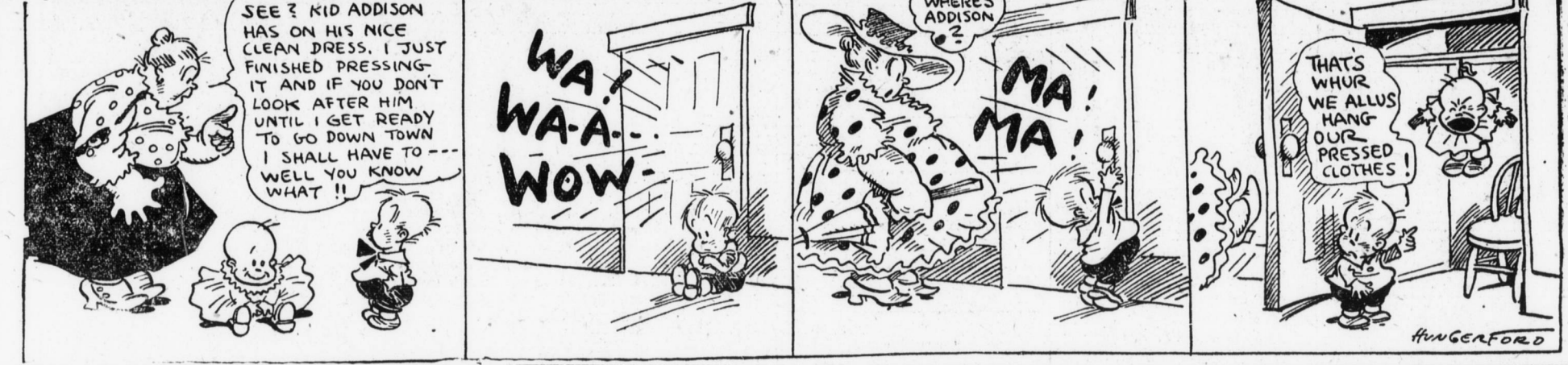
ARRANGE SERIES FOR LOCAL TEAMS

Labor Day afternoon at 3 o'clock at Island Park, will see the winners of the Allison Hill and the West End League meet in the first of a series of five contests for the championship of the city. The fourth game will go to the Island Saturday afternoon, September 6. If a fifth game is necessary, the date and place of meeting will be determined later.
