ROBINSON NEW TENNIS CHAMPION

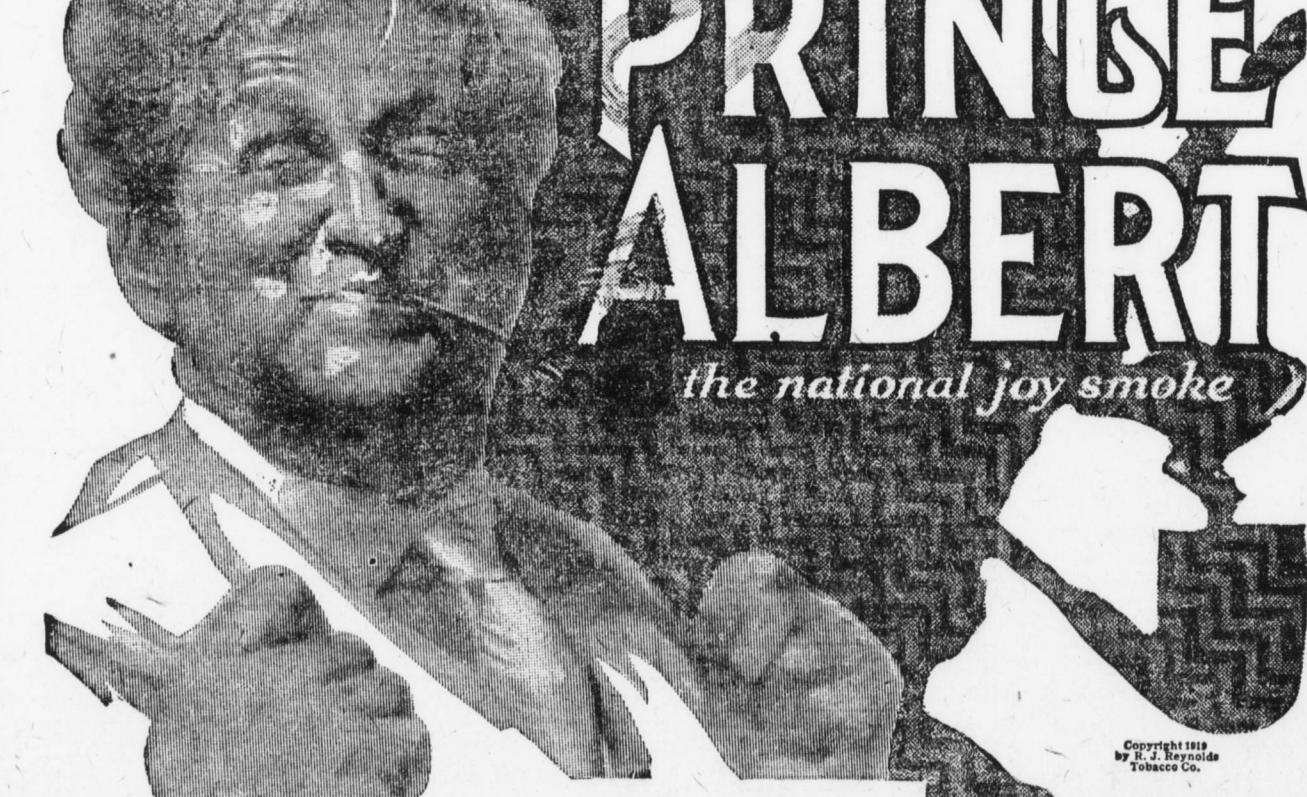
Defeats Glenwood Beard in Final Tournament Matches; Scores of Games Close
