These Boys Meet at Steelton in Near Future; Big Changes at Hall

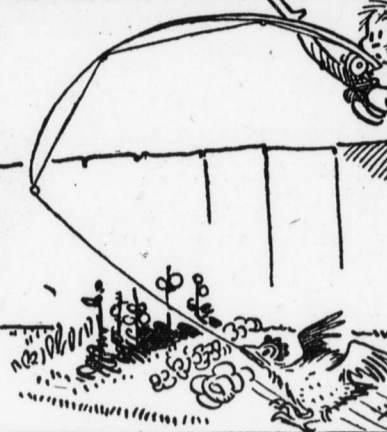
