State Police Maul Striking Women of Scranton Silk Mills

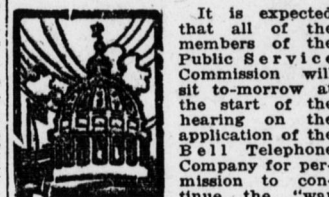

BELL TELEPHONE CASE TOMORROW

Action of Wide Spread Interest in State Will Be Started by Commission



It is expected that all of the members of the Public Service Commission will sit to-morrow at the start of the hearing on the application of the Bell Telephone Company for permission to continue the "war rates" after December 1 in Pennsylvania.

The city of Pittsburgh will appear to-morrow as objector to continuance of the rates. The city several years ago protested against the telephone rates in that city and as a result of the inquiry which was set on foot and a valuation made, the rates were ordered which were to stand for three years, but which were set aside when the United States Government took over the wires.

The policy of the Commission in regard to telephone rates will be developed in the next few months. Many of the so-called independent and rural lines have lately filed increases in rates which will be effective if no objections are entered before the Commission.

Welfare Commission—A call for a meeting of the State Welfare Commission in this city to decide upon the scope of future work and to consider the charges of rent profiteering in Philadelphia and other cities will be issued in a few days.

Bridges Approved—The Pennsylvania Water Supply Commission has authorized the construction of fifteen county bridges and a number of extensive improvements to dams.

Clearing Records—Clearing of the State records of companies which are no longer active and which are classed as defunct has been started by the Auditor General's Department.

The First Arrest—The first arrest to be made of a man for failing to make the proper return of sale of an automobile under the act of 1919 has been reported from Philadelphia.

Deny Profit Charge—Representatives of Philadelphia property owners have filed with the Governor denials of the charges made by the Philadelphia Tenants' Protective Association that the houses are being kept idle.

Capitol Closed—This was a holiday on Capitol Hill and very few of the departments were open.

Men Wanted—State aid has been asked for ship construction. The order for 27 more ships at Hog Island has caused many requests to be made.

Contract Approved—The contract for lighting of Potstown for five years between the borough and the Philadelphia Suburban Gas and Electric Company has been approved by the Public Service Commission.

Will File Soon—The answer of the State in the appropriation equity suit will be filed by the Attorney General's Department in a few days.

Up to Governor—A large number of new electric charters have been sent to the Governor for his action by the Public Service Commission.

Huge Crop Sends the Feed Prices Down; Better Poultry Results

Kansas City, Sept. 16.—Cheaper poultry feed prices, which will yield considerable pressure on poultry markets, already prevail in the southwest. While declines in the prices of the grains entering principally into poultry feeds have been sensational in the past month, the market continues to show extreme weakness, pointing to further recessions.

Johnson Made Head of Wharton School

Philadelphia, Sept. 16.—Dr. Emory R. Johnson, head of the Department of Commerce and Transportation, has accepted the position of dean of the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania.

Italy's Big Battleship Conte Di Cavour Here

New York, Sept. 16.—The Conte di Cavour, one of the four super-dreadnaughts built by Italy just before the outbreak of the war, is anchored off Tompkinsville. The battleship, which is carrying Admiral Hugo Conz and a staff of Italian naval officers, was at Newport during the first week of this month.
