Chicago's Building Strike Is Ended Men Win Demands

Chicago, Sept. 20.—Chicago's building strike and lockout which for more than two months had made idle more than 100,000 workers and halted construction contracts aggregating \$50,000,000, was announced as ended last night when the construction employers yielded to the demands of the union carpenters for \$1 an hour.

TWO DIE AT HOME Marietta, Pa., Sept. 20.—Within a few hours apart two deaths occurred at the Elizabethtown Home. Mrs. Mary F. Fite, aged 71 years, died of cancer. Robert McCracken, 40 years old, died of a stroke. They were natives of Philadelphia.

Clemenceau Halts Electoral Law Debate

Paris, Sept. 20.—Premier Clemenceau's intervention in the debate on the electoral law, which threatened to be prolonged indefinitely, settled the discussion in a few minutes yesterday, the government taking the stand that the elections should be held according to the law of July last, providing for proportional representation. The debate on the subject had been going on in morning sessions for nearly three weeks.

There was a persistent rumor yesterday in peace conference circles and in the chamber that Premier Clemenceau and Marshal Foch would visit America in December. The Associated Press was informed that no plans are possible until after the elections, which will probably be held November 11. The municipal elections now are scheduled to take place first.

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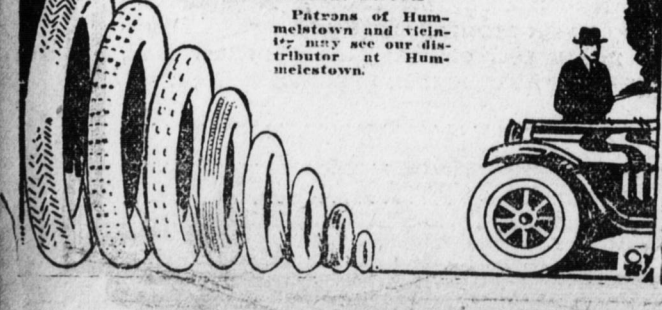
