Railway Shopmen Accept 8-Hour Day and Increases Up to 20 Cents an Hour

New York, Sept. 22.—Representatives of the six international unions of railroad shopmen have, it was announced in labor circles yesterday, come to an agreement on wages with Walker D. Hines, United States Railroad Administrator. By the terms of the new agreement, which it is expected will be formally published in Washington this week, 600,000 men receive the eight-hour day and increases ranging up to twenty cents an hour.

The unions affected make up tha Railway, Department of the American Federation of Labor and include the International Association of Machinists, International Brotherhood of Bollermakers, Iron Shipbuilders and Assistants, International Brotherhood of Elacksmitha and Helpers, the Sheet Metal Workers' Alliance, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and the Railway Carmen's Union of America.


