Resuming Stand Declares He Will Not Meet Any Representative of Labor

Washington, Oct. 2.—Charges of union leaders that the United States Steel Corporation employed many foreigners in order to prevent the unionizing of the men were denied today by Albert H. Gary, chairman of the corporation's board, when he resumed his testimony before the Senate Committee investigating the steel strike.

U. S. Intervention at Trau Prevented War Between Italy and Slavs

Washington, Oct. 2.—Intervention by the American naval forces at Trau, Dalmatia, prevented bloodshed "which would perhaps have resulted in a state of actual war between Italy and Yugoslavia," according to a report from Admiral Knapp, commanding American naval forces in European waters, transmitted to the Senate today by Secretary Daniels.

Raid "Moonshine" Stills in Farmhouse Cellars

Englishtown, N. J., Oct. 2.—Two "moonshine" liquor stills concealed in the cellars of farmhouses six miles from the center of this town were raided by Federal revenue agents early today. Three persons were arrested charged with the illegal manufacture of whiskey and complete still outfits, eighteen barrels of "mash" and a large quantity of sugar and other materials were seized.
