IF UNIONS WIN, MILLS WILL DECAY, GARY WARNS

Presenting Corporation's Side in Probe, He Declares U. S. Cannot Keep Up in Race With World; Means Dropping of Production, He Says

Washington, Oct. 2. — If unions control industries in the United States "it means decay and the dropping of production," Judge Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation, declared in presenting the corporation's side of the steel strike to the Senate investigating committee...

Open Shop Big Issue

Reiterating that the "open shop" was the big issue in the present strike, Judge Gary declared that it was "the opinion of the world that open shops mean more production, better methods and more prosperity, and that closed shops mean lower production and less prosperity..."

Referring to testimony of President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, that Jefferson D. Pierce, a union organizer, had been beaten by company agents while attempting to organize unions in the steel mills and died from injuries...

Judge Gary declined to disclose the contents of messages sent him by President Wilson in an effort to avert the steel strike...

Port Royal Pastor Has Compiled Memorial History

The Rev. John B. Kniseley, pastor of the Port Royal Lutheran Church, Port Royal, Pa., has compiled and is about to publish a Memorial History in honor of the Soldiers of his charge.

The book will contain 72 pages, including the photo and war records of 38 soldiers of the World War, 9 photos and war records of Civil War Veterans, lists or membership of the two churches of the charge, and a history of both churches from their beginning; also a record of the former pastors.

Two soldiers from this charge paid the supreme sacrifice. Sergeant J. Delbert Nipple was killed in action on the Meuse Front on Nov. 10, 1918. Lieut. C. Walt Beaver died in Washington, D. C., Jan. 7, 1919, while serving in the Operating Division of the Quartermaster Department...

Cost of Elections High in France

Paris, Oct. 2. — The cost of elections is expected to be about three times as high as those of 1914. This is due to the advanced cost of printing, traveling and incidentals.

Six hundred and two members of the Chamber of Deputies are to be elected and it is predicted that the average expenses of each will be 50,000 francs.
