awaiting daylight to renew hostilities.

Governor Charles Brough, who is accompanying the troops, was expected to call conference between representative whites and negroes during the day.

The race trouble started with an attack Tuesday evening upon W. A. Adkins, a special railroad officer. Charles Pratt, a deputy sheriff, and a negro trusty, who had gone by automobile to Elaine to arrest a suspected "bootlegger." The officers stopped near Elaine to repair a tire puncture and were fired upon by unknown persons. Adkins fell dead and deputy Pratt was wounded. The negro escaped and called the sheriffs office here by telephone and advised officials of the affair.

Posse Fired Upon A posse was immediately sent to Elaine, where it was fired upon, it is said, by negroes. The fight, which continued all day yesterday, followed. When the situation became dangerous, the Government was asked to send troops. As there is no national guard in the state, governor Brough obtained permission for troops to be sent from Camp Pike.

30 Miles From Volcano

Arrest Negro Suspepct in Connection With Attack on Woman Omaha, Neb., Oct. 2.—One negro suspect was under arrest to-day in connection with the attack of Mrs. H. G. Wisener, a white woman, yesterday afternoon. Military authorities in control of the city since last Sunday's rioting, refused to say where the negro was confined, or the extent of the evidence against him.

The attack, one of a series of 38 similar crimes since June 1 occurred within a few blocks of Army head quarters, where a machine gun is mounted. News of the crime was withheld in the afternoon paptrs at the request of Major General Leonard Wood, who is actively in command of the situation since the relinquishment of the control of the city by acting Mayor W. 
