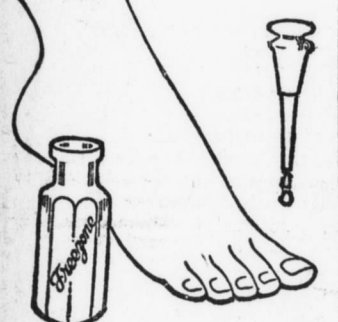

TWO AIRPLANE CRASHES KILL 1 AND HURT 2

Veteran Flyer and Former Chief of Staff, First Army Air Service, Dies

Philadelphia, Oct. 6.—Fifteen minutes after Colonel Townsend Dodd, commander of Langley Field, Virginia, had been killed in landing at the Bustleton aviation field, near here yesterday, a second made a bad landing and three other Army officers were injured, two of them, Major M. Davis and Second Lieutenant Thomas R. Colt, seriously.

Crashes Into Tree Colonel Dodd accompanied by Sergeant G. E. Hess, was piloting a De Havilland four type of machine from Langley field. He reached the Bustleton field shortly before 4:30 p. m. and in landing crashed into a tree. The machine was wrecked and Colonel Dodd was wedged so tightly between the engine and the fuselage that he could not extricate himself.

Second to Crash Colonel Dodd's body had scarcely been removed from the wreckage when the second accident happened. Major Davis, who was piloting the machine from Washington, apparently overshot the field and instead of landing where the smooth surface would give time for its weight of the machine to break its progress, landed on rough ground.

PIONEER AIRMAN Washington, Oct. 6.—Colonel Townsend Dodd, commander of Langley field, Virginia, and one of the first American officers to receive an aviator's commission, was killed at Bustleton field, near Philadelphia, when the air service was advised last night.

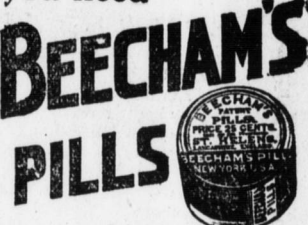
This mobilization is the first step in the attempt this year to carry out the provisions of the Slater law for compulsory training of all boys within the age limits.
