Miss Wallis is a graduate from the National School of Domestic Arts and Science at Washington, D. C. Three courses are offered, they are as follows:

**Elementary Course**  
Care and arrangement of kitchen; study of values; simple preparation of cereals, beverages, vegetables, cheese and eggs; baking powder mixtures; cream soups, desserts and candy.

**Advanced Course**  
Study of food continued. Preparation of meats, fish, bread and biscuits; plain pastry; frying deep fat; canning; making; salads and combination of foods.

**Housekeeping Course**  
Choice cuts of meats, fish and game; frozen desserts; rich cake mixtures and hot breads; spicing and pickling; fancy candy; salads; preparation of picnic luncheons and uses of dining table; combinations of foods; food values and costs; care and arrangement of rooms in the house; care of dishes, silver and linen; setting of table and serving of meals; planning of menus.
